

### Quick Poll Results: Dentists Disagree on Role of Dental Therapists

Dentists and hygienists who responded to our November Quick Poll are split almost 50-50 on whether dentists in their state should have the option to hire a dental therapist, a relatively new group of dental professionals authorized in very few states. With 504 votes cast, 249 (49 percent) respondents opposed and 244 (48 percent) supported dental therapists working in their states. #### Dentists Need To Use Available Tools To Avoid Dangerous Opioid Prescribing Practices

NSAIDS are the best choice for dental pain; they work as well or better than opioids and, overall, dentists are prescribing fewer opioids.[1] But you wouldn't know that by looking at some dentists' prescription pads. In 2012 and 2013, South Carolina dentists wrote an average of 150 opioid prescriptions per year that were filled, a 2016 study in The Journal of the American Dental Association reported. Most importantly, many recipients were also getting opioids from other prescribers-information that the dentists could have learned from their state prescription drug monitoring program (PDMP).

The study authors analyzed 2.3 million prescription records from South Carolina's PDMP. South Carolina ranks among the top 13 states for number of painkiller prescriptions per person.[2] <u>Read</u> more...

[1] Trends in Opioid Analgesic-Prescribing Rates by Specialty, U.S., 2007-2012."The greatest percentage increase in opioid-prescribing rates during 2007-2012 occurred among physical medicine/rehabilitation specialists (+12.0%).
