Dry mouth, or xerostomia, is a multifactorial oral condition characterized by loss of salivary function.



Repairing Restorations Gets Good Results

Repairing, rather than replacing, a defective restoration is not a widely accepted practice, but a new study shows that repaired restorations hold up about as well as replaced ones, while saving the tooth's structure and causing less stress to the pulp of the tooth. Other studies have shown that replacing restorations results in a significant loss of healthy tooth structure.

In a study published in the December 2015 Journal of the American Dental Association, 195 dentists treated 5,889 failed restorations, repairing 25 percent (1,498) and replacing 75 percent (4,391). Replacement was defined as removing the entire defective or failed restoration and any adjacent problematic areas. (The study didn't include restorations that were incorporated into a larger restoration.) <u>Read more...</u>
