Meeting Presentations & Highlights



Dr. James Bader: <u>Caries</u> <u>Management through Assessment</u> <u>and Incomplete Removal</u>

- There is evidence that incomplete caries removal is more successful at reducing pulp exposure as compared to complete caries removal
- Current caries risk assessments are moving towards a"caries prediction" model and attempt to identify individuals at high-risk
- Past studies have found that 1/3 of patients present with at least one suspicious occlusal caries lesion, but almost half of opened lesions didn't extend to the dentin, were inactive, or not present
- Better methods of identification are needed - an upcoming network study will investigate two diagnostic devices and their utility

Meeting attendees reviewed CATs and reflected on how the findings aligned with their clinical practice (i.e., correct, incorrect, needs qualification, no experience) and rated its clinical importance on a scale from 1-5

Dr. Dena Fischer: YOUR National Dental Practice-Based Research Network

Dr. Fischer from the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research spoke about the development and structure of the National Dental PBRN. The various opportunities for practitioner engagement in the network were discussed. Dr. Fischer emphasized that the network strives to be centered around the practitioner in everything it does.



Dr. John Rugh: Applying your Clinical Experience to Critically Appraised Topics (CATs)

- The major increase in dental publications makes it difficult for practitioners to keep up-to-date
- A CAT is a structured 1-page summary of the best available evidence on a focused question
- Practitioners can now provide a rating for each CAT based on how consistent and important these results are within their daily practice
 see an example of a rating our practitioners did below!

UT CAT #602: In terms of longevity, dental amalgam and resin composite are comparable. In larger restorations, amalgam may be the material of choice as its failure rates are slightly lower than resin composite, especially for patients at high risk for caries.

Breakout Session #1

Breakout Session #2

Dentists and hygienists were divided into separate groups to work with Dr. Julia Melkers to provide feedback on the upcoming network study "Understanding the Dental Information Networks around Novel Nicotine Products."
